# 'Connect to Reading - Reading to connect'

Week 5 of this term (next week) is Book Week, the week set aside to celebrate the best books published by Australian authors and illustrators during 2013. The theme for Book Week this year is **Connect to Reading** – reading to connect.

Over the past few weeks, in the lessons students have with me in the library, we have been looking at the books nominated and shortlisted by the Children's Book Council of Australia. The winners of the Book Week awards will be announced by the Children's Book Council on Friday 15th August. Next week classes are doing a variety of activities to celebrate Book Week. On Monday some classes have invited grandparents in to read with students, other classes are visiting the Goolwa Public Library or participating in the Craig Smith author session at the Victor Harbor library. Also some of the Junior Primary classes are having a 'book character' dress up parade on Friday.

The library will be open at lunch times for story reading and for students to experiment with using AR apps on the iPads to enable them to read QR codes to connect to book reviews written by the Year 2/3 class and also to scan AR (augmented reality) symbols to connect them to video clips embedded in AR books.

This love is nurturing, accepting and protective, even guiding children and looking out for their best interests. It's a connecting love from the time they are born our maternal and paternal instincts usually kick in and a love grows for the children who are put into our lives.

Children's outlook on love grows as they experience love for themselves, they can then return that love to us or to others. An example of this is-:

A little 5 year old boy saw his elderly neighbour in his yard, he had recently lost his wife and the boy seeing his neighbour crying went over to him and sat with him. When the mother of the little boy asked what he said to the neighbour he said simply "Nothing, I just helped him cry".

We can learn so much from children as they don't love with expectations of anything in return, they just love.

# When can I find the time for my child to read the take-home book?

The ideal situation would be to sit with your child, but that's not always possible. Here's how you might manage a busy weeknight scenario.

Reading a book in the car-: As you're travelling in the car, ask your child to read to you from the back seat. While you can't see the book, you'll know whether what is said 'sounds right'. If what your child is reading doesn't sound right, you could say:

- Sorry, I missed that bit. Can you read it to me again?
- I'm not sure what the author meant there.
- I love that bit. Read it to me again.
- So what was the character doing?
- I wish I could see the pictures/photos/drawings.
   Tell me about them
- Who was it that said?
- What did they say about?
- What did you just say?

These **approaches** can also be **used** when **preparing meals**.
