External Review Reminder:

Monday and Tuesday the 1st and 2nd of June (week 6) Port Elliot Primary School will be undertaking an external review process. This will involve an External Review Officer from DECD Department for Education for Child Development and a Principal from another school. The review will focus on student learning and improvement from Reception to Year 7. During the days the review officers will be talking with staff, students, parents and members of the Governing Council. The Governing Council meeting will take place at 7pm on Monday June 1st to allow for a presentation and questions from the review officers. School Budget and School fees

Like all families and businesses the school has a budget. The cost of running Port Elliot Primary School is close to \$3 million dollars. This includes all wages, computers, utilities like water and electricity, resources and some site improvements, books, pencils, paper, readers, sports equipment etc. The Governments (State and Australian) give the school most of our income based on student enrolments.

An amount for materials and services is charged per student to parents. The finance committee of Governing Council has ensured that parents are only charged the legal recoverable amount. The amount this year is \$226.

Many Government schools charge parents up to \$100 more in fees and families coming from non-Government schools to Port Elliot Primary School are surprised at the value for money at just over a dollar a day.

The finance committee recognises that family circumstances at times means that paying this may be a struggle however, like your own budget, commitments have been made in the school budget based on recovering \$226 for every child.

Payment may be

- through an approved school card application, which must be done each year as family circumstances change
- by making payments over time and entering into a direct debit payment plan that contributes regularly.
- payment in full.

Thank you to those who have already paid their fees. We are still waiting on over one third of students fees. If you have not paid your school fees please speak with Jo Colbeck, our finance officer as soon as possible.

Helping children learn to manage anger

When children get caught up with angry feelings it can be quite difficult for them to calm down. This is because the body gets ready to fight when we are angry and can take some time to return to normal. Teaching children steps to cool down their anger can help

There are lots of ways to relax-:

Some useful ways to teach children to use relaxation strategies to calm their angry feelings are:

- Deep breathing
- Slow deep breathing has a very helpful calming effect. Getting children to practise breathing in deeply and breathing out very slowly, can help to calm down angry feelings.

Visualisation

 Have children visualise a very relaxing scene in their minds. For example, they might imagine themselves floating on an air bed in a swimming pool. You can combine deep breathing with visualisation. For example, ask children to imagine a candle in front of them. As they exhale, ask them to imagine making the candle flicker but not go out.

Robot/rag doll technique

• The robot/rag doll technique is useful for helping young children release muscle tension. Ask children to tense up all muscles in the body and visualise themselves as robots. Have them hold this tense state for approximately 15 seconds. Then ask them to release all the tension and visualise themselves as rag dolls, with all muscles very loose, and stay relaxed like this for 15 seconds

KATHY TURLEY Age: 41 School: Port Elliot Primary School Role: Teaching and Learning Co-ordinator

How long have you been teaching?

What do you do?

I am currently working one day a week as the Teaching and Learning Co-ordinator with a focus on innovation and numeracy for 21st century learners. I am working closely with the school's leadership team and teachers to develop ways that we can incorporate innovative teaching into all curriculum areas at Port Elliot Primary School. We are currently working with an international company called NoTosh based in Melbourne, to support our teachers to develop lessons that encourage students to solve real problems in innovative and creative ways.

How did you end up as a 21st century learning coordinator?

I have always been interested in using technology and innovative teaching practices with my students. I enjoy watching students engage with their learning through connecting outside of the walls of their classrooms.

Why is this role important? The advancement of technologies means that students learn differently to when we went to school. Today it is easy to "google" answers to things but not understand what it means. Students need to be educated about how to ask good questions and think creatively about their world. By using the internet and a simple webcam they have access to specialists, professors, families and classes across the world. Why keep students just inside the classroom?

Does it have a teaching component?

I have four days in a year 6/7 classroom. I love these days because I enjoy working directly with students and it also gives me a chance to put into practice the things I am showing my colleagues. For example, last year our class connected with a class in New Zealand to create a collaborative project using Google Docs and Scratch to teach other students about cybersafety.

Do you run professional development sessions?

I have run a number of PD sessions for colleagues. Some of the topics I have supported staff with include using blogs to connect with the world, setting up a professional Twitter account, using QR codes to engage students and using iPads creatively in the classroom. What is innovative in education at the moment? Education is exciting at the moment. The ability to open the classroom to the world is changing the way students learn. Things such as Mystery Skype allows students to meet, talk to and interact with other students across the world. A lesson on volcanoes

means a lot more when you

can talk to a student who lives near an active volcano.
