performance opportunities.


Oral Language Across The Fleurieu

"We live at the level of our language.
Whatever we can articulate we can imagine or understand or explore".

(Ellen Gilchrist, 2000).

This is the first in a short series of articles designed to share the importance of Oral Language development in our children.

We will explain why developing a rich vocabulary in our children is important, as well as strategies that you can use at home along with how teachers support oral language development in the classroom.



On the 12th June 2018, Elliot Primary School hosted a professional development day which was attended by teachers from schools across the Fleurieu. Dr Margery Hertzberg from the University of Sydney shared her vast knowledge and expertise of Oral Language Development. Oral language lays the foundation for the reading and writing skills children will develop as they enter kindergarten and progress through their school years. They use Oral Language in all aspects of their education, in the classroom as they connect with their peers and teachers, and throughout their lives as they grow into adulthood.

Having a solid foundation in Oral Language will help children become successful readers and strong communicators as well as build their confidence and overall sense of well-being.

What is Oral Language

- Information sharing
- Telling others how you feel
- Giving Advice
- Persuading others
- Entertaining
- Sharing Ideas
- Remembering and Retelling

The 30 Million Word Gap

- "Meaningful Differences in the Everyday Experiences of Young American Children" by Todd Risley, Ph.D. and Betty Hart, Ph.D. followed every word spoken to 42 families for one hour, a week, for over three years.
- There was a 30 million gap in the number of words heard by children by the age of four years old.
- Children who had heard more words in books, songs, and conversation scored higher on IQ/intelligence tests.
- When the children were tested at age three and age nine, the differences held.
- Children's school success is directly connected to how many words they hear between birth and age three

Why oral language development is so important

Being proficient in oral language provides children with a vital tool. Without fluent and structured oral language, children can find it very difficult to think. Studies have shown that children's vocabulary can vary greatly. Studies on children Aged 4 showed that their word knowledge varied from 500 words to 1100 words. Studies on students in grade one varied from 5,000 words to 20,000 words (Moats 2001).

Children who enter school with limited vocabulary knowledge increasingly are unable to communicate over time with their peers who have a richer vocabulary knowledge. This vocabulary gap can also impact on a student's reading ability. Vocabulary is related to reading comprehension. Knowing the meaning of words and being able to understand the message being conveyed supports students to comprehend written texts (Osborn & Hiebert, 2004).

Both parents and teachers are vital in ensuring students develop a rich oral vocabulary. In our next article, we will share how parents and caregivers can support oral language development at home.
