FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK

Positive feedback from External School Review

Community is a core value and central to our everyday. Having this validated by the External School Review (ESR) team, further acknowledges our focus. Special mention was made of children, parents, carers and staff all acknowledging the positive and vibrant culture where people feel supported and motivated to work cohesively.

One of the directions identified three years ago, was to review and improve student writing outcomes. The ESR team noted significant success in this area with clear policies and consistent programs across all classes and students engaged in rigorous learning at all year levels.

The ESR findings are further supported by our excellent achievement in writing in 2023 NAPLAN. The Fleurieu region had seven Year 3 children who achieved the top level 'Exceeding' in writing and three of these were from Port Elliot Primary. There were thirteen Year 5 students who achieved the top level 'Exceeding' in writing, seven of which were from Port Elliot Primary. An outstanding result!

FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK (CONT.)

The ESR determined three new directions:

- Staff will work with students to better reflect on intended success criteria as a means for directing future learning.
- Staff will be supported to use Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) to moderate and review student learning.
- Student agency will be an on-going focus with greater opportunities for student voice, purpose and self-efficacy in learning.

A more detailed report is available on the school web site and we welcome any feedback and comments from families. Governing Council will be closely involved with the School Improvement Plan (SIP) process and welcome any questions and suggestions from families.

BRINGING THE NGARRINDJERI RUWI MURAL TO LIFE

No doubt the beautiful Mural currently in progress on the side of the Nunga Yiti and Indonesian rooms has caught your eye!

Our Reconciliation Action Committee (RAP) have invested much time into this vision. We are fortunate that it has come to fruition through the Vibrant Communities Grant from Alexandrina Council and the support of our school Parent Network and wider community in raising funds to employ local artists and secure resourcing.

Kristal Matthew's and her sister, Jazz, are the talented artists bringing the mural, titled 'Ngarrindjeri Ruwi' to life. They consulted with and have been guided by Aunty Phyllis a proud Ngarrindjeri woman and Elder, in creating this significant piece.

The mural tells a story of a culture intertwined with the seasons, the wildlife, and the land.

Our students have spent time over the last two weeks learning about the meaning behind the mural, including some Ngarrindjeri words.

The mural is in progress with still more elements to add, please stop by to have a yarn with Kristal if you see her busy at work on this masterpiece. Below is the story and meaning behind the mural.

This artwork depicts some of the flora and fauna found on Ngarrindjeri Ruwi (Country).







NGARRINDJERI RUWI (CONT.)

The waterways represent the Kurangk (Coorong), rivers, lakes and beaches found throughout Ngarrindjeri Ruwi. There are different animals including thukubi (turtle), pondi (Murray cod) and thukeri (bony bream). Kuti (cockle) and kungari (swan) eggs are seen by the bulrush and the rushes. Bulrush roots are used to make string. The rushes are used for lakun (weaving), they can be picked all year round but ideally during the warm summer months.

The wanggami (kangaroo) and pinyali (emu) along with their tracks are seen along the hills. The norengk (pelicans) are flying above the sand.

The meeting place with people around it represents the importance of caring for community, working together and listening to Elders.

There is a scar tree in the centre. Scar trees are found all throughout Ruwi, some are scars made from canoes like this one represents. The best time to make a canoe is during the cold seasons, this is to make it easier for the wood to come off.

The colours by the tree represent a variety of native resources. The nganangi (pigface) have red fruit that can be eaten, they ripen during summer. The leaves can be soaked overnight and then eaten with fish or meat.

The juice from the nganangi leaves provide relief from insect bites. Yalkari (Old man's beard) which when steamed is used to relieve aches and pains.







NGARRINDJERI RUWI

River mint which is used as a tea and helpful with digestion. Dandelions which are used as an indicator of the seasons, for safety reasons you can't go into the water until they have dropped. Munthari (muntrie) fruits during summer. And the parangunhi (ruby saltbush) products edible berries that are yellow, pink or red.

On the other side of the tree there is a shield, spear and boomerang, resources made from a she-oak tree.

There is a ritjaruki (willy wagtail) flying in the wulun (sky). In the yarluwar (ocean) are different animals, dolphin, milori (stingray), kondoli (whale) and a pungari (seal).

The rocks the penguins are on represent those on Kaiki (Granite Island), and the textures and colours are being added by the po:rlar (children) of Port Elliot Primary School using their fingerprints. Some of the rocks will be left blank so the next few years of Reception students and new students can also leave their mark on the mural. A commitment to walk together caring for each other and Country.

All the animals on Ruwi are important to maintain a thriving ecosystem.

Look after Country and Country will look after you. (Aunty Phyllis Williams, Kristal Matthews and Jazz Matthews)

We thank Aunty Phyllis for sharing her vast knowledge on Ngarrindjeri seasons and culture with our community and we are eternally grateful for her time and that too of Kristal and Jazz in strengthening our understanding and appreciation through art and language. We are proud that the Ngarrindjeri Ruwi Mural will be a prominent piece of our school fabric for years to come.
