Students may have improved since their last report at the end of 2017, but their achievement grade may not have changed, as they are measured against the next year level. The most important part is that the students are always doing their best to improve by approaching learning with a growth mindset. A "C" achievement is at standard and therefore a good result.

NAIDOC week gives us the opportunity to celebrate Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island people, history & culture. This year NAIDOC week is being held in the first week of the school holidays.

The theme for 2018 is 'Because of her, we can', celebrating significant women in all of our lives but especially within our indigenous cultures: mothers, grandmothers, aunties, carers, sisters, wives etc.

On Tuesday, July 3 our Nunga students and Margie Hancock travelled by bus to the Victor Harbor community NAIDOC event. We marched from Grosvenor gardens down the main street to Warland Reserve where we were welcomed to country in Ngarrindjeri by Kyla McHughes and Olivia Davis. Kyla has been supporting the Ngarrindjeri language as an elective at VHHS and Olivia is one of the students, so it was wonderful that they delivered the welcome together.

Ngarrindjeri elder Uncle Archie Kartinyeri, one of our PEPS parents, Roy Alick (Torres Strait Island man) and the mayor of Victor Harbor, Graeme Phelp, then raised the three flags.

There was a free BBQ lunch and loads of kids' activities. Kondoli, the whale tent, had story telling sessions in the tram barn. We had some wonderful music entertainment by Les Cameron and Jade McHughes, the Deadly Nanna's and Hannah Yates. Nina Oughton from Southern Fleurieu Health worked tirelessly to make this event happen (another PEPS parent!), along with the working group committee. One of the committee members, Jade McHughes our ACEO was the MC for the event.

We have been learning about the Solar System including the moon, stars, planets and Sun.












